On behalf of the Governor, I am pleased to submit the FY2011 Arizona State Emergency Council August 1, 2011 Report.

A.R.S. §35-192, E, provides that each August 1st a report of the activities conducted by the council shall be prepared. This report describes the Gubernatorial proclamations of FY2011, the proclamations that were terminated, continuing, actions taken by the State Emergency Council and attachments detailing expenditures by event and type.

During the period from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011, the Governor signed seven proclamations that provided financial and technical assistance to: Coconino County and the City of Flagstaff for post-fire flooding; Navajo County and the Hopi Tribe for monsoon flooding; Greenlee and Santa Cruz Counties for monsoon flooding; Coconino County and the Havasupai Tribe for tornados and flooding; Mohave County and the communities of Beaver Dam/Littlefield and Colorado City for winter storm flooding; Apache and Greenlee Counties as well as the San Carlos Apache and White Mountain Apache Tribes for the Wallow Fire; and finally Cochise County for the Horseshoe Two and Monument Fires.

The Department of Emergency and Military Affairs is the lead state agency for disaster preparedness, response, recovery and mitigation and provides critical support to the citizens of the state and its political subdivisions through the Arizona National Guard and the Division of Emergency Management. August 1, 2011 Report

FY2011

July 1, 2010 – June 30, 2011

In compliance with section §35-192E of the Arizona Revised Statutes, the following report is a summary of obligations, allocations and expenditures of state funds under the authority granted by the State Legislature in §35-192E, Arizona Revised Statutes. The report represents the actions taken by the Governor and the Arizona State Emergency Council (Council) in response to Arizona's emergency needs during FY2011 beginning July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011.

I. GUBERNATORIAL PROCLAMATIONS DECLARED

As a result of emergency situations, which were beyond the capability and resources of local government, seven gubernatorial proclamations were declared during FY2011.

A. Schultz Fire Post-Fire Flooding Emergency (11001)

Declared: July 21, 2010

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1940-DR-AZ: October 4, 2010

Amended: November 22, 2010

On July 20, 2010 an early afternoon rainfall of about 1.6" to 2" within a 30 minute timeframe fell on the steep terrain and intense burn area of the Schultz Fire. This rain caused flash flooding of debris, ash, mud and rain flow approximately 400' wide x 2' deep from the watershed into the impacted communities of Timberline, Doney Park and Wupatki in the Flagstaff area. As a direct result of this flash flooding, local emergency personnel conducted search and rescue operations. These operations freed stranded residents and searched for a 12 year old child swept away by the flows. The child was found deceased.

Excessive response costs were incurred due to the prolonged incident period of July 20 – August 7, 2010. Physical impacts to infrastructure include debris obstructing roadways, exposed and damaged utilities (power, telephone/data, waterline) as well as significant damage to roads.

The President declared a major disaster for Coconino County, activating the Public Assistance Program and making available the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program to political subdivisions statewide. Both of these programs are to be administered by the Arizona Division of Emergency Management.

On November 22, 2010, the President amended this declaration to include the Hopi Tribe. FEMA is providing the Hopi Tribe with support for the Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs. As a sovereign nation the Hopi Tribe is working directly with DHS/FEMA and will provide for their non-federal cost share.

Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$1,500,000 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$2,437,403 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

B. Hopi Tribe Flood Emergency (11002)

Declared: July 30, 2010

On July 26, 2010, a severe storm over a widespread area of the Hopi Tribe produced approximately 3 inches of heavy rainfall. The heavy rains resulted in an unusually strong flood event causing extreme peril to public health and safety. These water flows caused extensive damages to both private property and public infrastructure, including water and sewer lines that provide essential life services to Hopi Tribe residents.

Navajo County supported the Hopi Tribe with resources to respond to and support emergency protective measures taken to temporarily address the public health and safety issues with the impacted water and sewer lines; thereby restoring essential life services.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$100,000 to this emergency and at this time that amount demonstrates sufficient funding to address the situation.

C. Monsoon 2010 Flooding Emergency (11003)

Declaration: August 4, 2010

On July 19, 2010, through July 29, 2010, a series of potent monsoon thunderstorms causing high winds and flash floods damaged many locations in southeastern Arizona. The heavy rains resulted in unusually strong flooding events and caused extreme peril to public health and safety in two primary areas: Wards Canyon in Greenlee County and the Nogales Wash in Santa Cruz County. These water flows caused extensive damages to public infrastructure and threatened resources that provide essential life services to Greenlee and Santa Cruz residents, primarily roads and sewer lines.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$200,000 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$114,577 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

D. Coconino County Twister (11004)

Declaration: October 8, 2010

On October 6, 2010 a series of tornados impacted the communities of Bellemont, Parks and Fort Valley as well as nearby rural areas within Coconino County. The impact of these tornados caused minor injuries to

citizens, spread debris creating public safety challenges, damaged numerous structures and rendered utility systems inoperable in areas.

Repairs to damaged homes were covered under the individual homeowner's insurance. Coconino County sustained minor damages to roads, the City of Page Airport received damage due to lightning strikes and there were damages to buildings, perimeter road and fence line at Camp Navajo. The Page Airport identified a secondary funding source to support the repairs to the airstrip. Some of the damages sustained at Camp Navajo's facility are being covered by ADOA Risk Management and any eligible items not covered by Risk Management are being evaluated by ADEM for possible reimbursement under this declaration.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$200,000 to this emergency.

Federal

Havasupai Flash Flooding

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1950-DR-AZ: December 21, 2010

Rainfall and flooding began on October 3, 2010 and continued through October 6, 2010 impacting the concentrated area of Havasu Canyon. The Havasupai Indian Reservation is located in a very unique and isolated geographic region, deep within an inner gorge of the Grand Canyon. The reservation is surrounded by layers of cliffs, towering more than half a mile above the canyon bottom. The 1000' deep canyon encompasses a portion of the trail to and from the entire village of Supai and is a floodplain for Havasu Creek. The creek drains the canyon and surrounding highlands.

The heavy rains resulted in flash flooding in Cataract Creek causing three (3) major surges of water into Supai Canyon. This flash flooding resulted in the evacuation of 143 tourists out of the Canyon; no human lives were lost; however three (3) pack horses were swept away in the flood.

This storm severely damaged this community and public infrastructure that supports the Havasupai Tribe's sole source of income: tourism. Infrastructure impacts include bridges, campgrounds and trails which pose a threat to the health and safety of the Tribal members and local residents. The main trail leading into Supai Village is not passable and the severe damage to the trails and campgrounds also prevents mail delivery and supplies from entering into the village and threatens the financial livelihood of the Tribe. This impact has caused the indefinite closure of Havasu Canyon to tourism. Loss of work and distance to other employment options makes it near impossible to sustain revenue income for livelihood of the Tribal members.

The President declared a major disaster for the Havasupai Tribe. FEMA

is providing the Havasupai Tribe with support for the Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs. As a sovereign nation the Havasupai Tribe is working directly with DHS/FEMA and will provide for their non-federal cost share.

FEMA's initial meeting with the Tribe was held January 6, 2010 at the Sovereign Tribal National of the Havasupai Tribe in Supai Canyon. ADEM Representative was in attendance and the Tribe is welcoming ADEM's participation in an advisory/liaison capacity.

E. December 2010 Flooding (73001)

Declaration: January 27, 2011

Between December 18, 2010 and December 22, 2010, a series of heavy rainstorms caused flash floods that damaged several areas in northwestern Arizona. The heavy rains resulted in significant flooding causing extreme peril to public health and safety to residents of the Beaver Dam/Littlefield area and Town of Colorado City in Mohave County.

An abnormally high flow of water was measured in a tributary of the Virgin River in Beaver Dam/Littlefield, and created considerable damage to both public and private properties, including homes. Public infrastructure damage included the destruction of a lift station that caused a release of untreated sewage into the Virgin River until emergency protective measures could be taken to stem the flow. Sewer service was also disrupted to citizens in the area.

Additionally, several all-weather crossings of the Short Creek in Colorado City received damage to their roads that provide critical services and access to residents. The damage left only one main route of ingress and egress, as the affected roads were closed for an indeterminate amount of time due to the extent of the damage.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$100,000 to this emergency and there is an anticipated future allocation need of \$133,969 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

F. Wallow Fire (73002)

Declaration: June 6, 2011

The Wallow Fire began in the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forest in Greenlee County on May 29, 2011. The fire continues burning with moderate containment, and has burned substantial portions of Apache and Greenlee Counties, as well as the San Carlos Apache and White Mountain Apache Tribal lands. As of June 20, 2011, the fire had burned over 500,000 acres and was 51% contained.

Federal, state and local fire suppression resources have responded and are currently working to suppress the fire. Evacuations have been mandated in the communities of Greer, Nutrioso, Alpine, Eagar, Springerville and surrounding areas. Some of these evacuation notices have since been lifted.

Arizona State Forestry Division received a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) from FEMA on June 2, 2011. This grant will support the reimbursement of costs associated with suppression of the fire being directed by the Incident Management Team and emergency protective measures and response efforts conducted by agencies at the direction of Apache County. Funding allocated under this disaster declaration is to support costs not covered by the FMAG and/or for recovery support following suppression of the fire.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$200,000 to this emergency.

G. Horseshoe Two & Monument Fires (73003)

Declared: June 17, 2011

These two separate wildfires burned portions of Cochise County: the Horseshoe Two Fire broke out in the Chiricahua Mountains on May 8, 2011; the Monument Fire began in the Coronado National Memorial/Coronado National Forest on June 12, 2011. Both fires continue burning with moderate containment. As of June 20, 2011, the Horseshoe Fire has burned over 213,000 acres and is 80% contained; the Monument Fire has burned over 27,000 acres and is 27% contained.

The Monument Fire necessitated the evacuation of several communities in the Sierra Vista area. Both fires have consumed over 65 structures, including over 40 residential homes. The fires continue burning uncontrolled and are currently threatening additional homes, businesses and public infrastructure.

Arizona State Forestry Division received a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) from FEMA for the Horseshoe 2 fire on May 9, 2011 and for the Monument Fire on June 12, 2011. These grants will support the reimbursement of costs associated with suppression of the fire being directed by the Incident Management Team and emergency protective measures and response efforts conducted by agencies at the direction of Cochise County. Funding allocated under this disaster declaration is to support costs not covered by the FMAGs and/or for recovery support following suppression of the fires.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$100,000 to this emergency.

III. GUBERNATORIAL PROCLAMATIONS CONTINUING

A. **STATEWIDE DROUGHT EMERGENCY (99006)**

Declared: June 23, 1999

- The Governor proclaimed an emergency due to the lack of precipitation.
- On May 22, 2007, the Governor signed Executive Order 2007-10, Drought Declaration for The State of Arizona. The Order supplements the directives in the Statewide Drought Emergency and shall remain in effect until the Governor rescinds it.
- Loans that offset economic losses because of reduced revenues to farmers and ranchers caused by drought have been made available by USDA and Small Business Administration.
- No funding allocation from the Governor's Emergency Fund has been made.

B. **NORTHERN ARIZONA WINTER STORM EMERGENCY (25004) (Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-1581-AZ)**

Declared: December 29, 2004

Amended: December 30, 2004, January 4, 2005 and January 11, 2005

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1581-DR-AZ: February 17, 2005

- The President's declaration provided Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs for Coconino, Gila, Mohave, Navajo and Yavapai Counties and the Hopi and Navajo Nations.
- The Small Business Administration (SBA) declared an emergency for Mohave County.
- Maricopa County was not included in the Federal declaration as they did not meet the county threshold requirement in accordance with the federal regulation. Maricopa County is supported under the Governor's declaration.
- Five (5) applicants are in their final closeout processes. The remaining thirty-one (31) applicant files have been closed.

- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund are \$2,756,448 to date.

C. FEBRUARY 2005 WINTER STORMS & FLOODING EMERGENCY (25005)

(Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-1586-AZ)

Declared: February 16, 2005

Amended: March 8, 2005

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1586-DR-AZ: April 14, 2005

- The President's declaration provided Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs for the counties of Gila, Graham, Greenlee, Mohave, Pinal and Yavapai as well as the Havasupai Tribe, the Hopi Tribe, the San Carlos Apache Tribe and the portion of the Navajo Tribal Nation within the State of Arizona.
- Maricopa County was not included in the Federal declaration as they did not meet the county threshold requirement in accordance with the federal regulation. Maricopa County is supported under the Governor's declaration.
- Six (6) applicants are in their final closeout processes. The remaining twenty-eight (28) applicant files have been closed.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$4,212,689 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$492,795 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

D. OPERATION GOOD NEIGHBOR (26003)

(Presidential Declaration FEMA-EM-3241-AZ)

Declared: September 3, 2005

Presidential Declaration FEMA-3241-EM-AZ: September 12, 2005

- The Governor was requested by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to assist with the national state of emergency due to the catastrophic consequences of Hurricane Katrina.
- First evacuees arrived in Arizona on September 4, 2005.
- September 12, 2005, the President declared an Emergency Declaration for the support efforts provided by Arizona to include 100% federal reimbursement.
- Final payments have been disbursed and thirty-nine (39) applicant files are closed. Legal action was taken against citizens who falsely represented themselves as evacuees and subsequently received support from the Federal government. Restitution payments are being received as a direct result. This has impacted our ability to close this event this fiscal year.
- ADEM is in the process of closing out the disaster with DHS/FEMA.

- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund equal \$950,000, with \$700,000 already reverted back to the General Fund.

**E. SUMMER 2006 MONSOONS & FLOODING EMERGENCY (27001)
(Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-1660-AZ)**

Declaration: August 8, 2006

Amended: September 13, 2006

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1660-DR-AZ: September 7, 2006

Amended: September 29, 2006 and November 9, 2006

- The President's declaration and subsequent amendments made Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs available for Gila, Graham, Greenlee, Navajo, Pinal and Pima Counties, the Gila River Indian Community within Pinal County, the tribal areas of the Hopi Tribe within Navajo County, the Navajo Nation within Apache, Coconino and Navajo Counties and the Tohono O'Odham Nation within Pima and Pinal Counties.
- Six (6) applicants are in their final closeout processes. The remaining twenty-two (22) applicant files have been closed.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$1,906,217 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$1,014,097 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

F. JANUARY 2008 SEVERE PRECIPITATION EMERGENCY (28003)

Declaration: February 19, 2008

- The Governor's declaration was to support the Mt. Lemmon area of Pima County for the 8.5 inches of precipitation received within a 24-hour period beginning January 27, 2008.
- All recovery work has been completed; audits are being conducted and final reimbursements will be processed immediately following audit completion.
- Total allocations to this emergency were \$322,500.

G. SEDONA FLASH FLOOD EMERGENCY (20101)

Declaration: September 15, 2009

- The Governor's declaration supported the City of Sedona for impacts resulting from a severe isolated storm over the central portion of the City of Sedona which produced approximately 2.5 inches of heavy rainfall within a 45 minute period.
- All recovery work has been completed and final audits are being conducted. Final reimbursements will be processed immediately following audit completion.
- Total allocations to this emergency were \$200,000.

H. JANUARY 2010 WINTER STORM EMERGENCY (20102)

Declaration: January 21, 2010

Amended: February 11, 2010

Presidential Declarations: FEMA-3307-DR-AZ: January 24, 2010

FEMA-1888-DR-AZ: March 18, 2010

- The Governor declared an emergency for significant cumulative precipitation coupled with high winds and heavy snow in areas across Arizona from January 18 – 22, 2010. This storm system led to record levels of snowfall and significant flooding posing an extreme danger to public health and safety.
- On January 24, 2010 the Governor submitted a request to the President for an Emergency Declaration in support of life sustaining efforts to the citizens of the Hopi Tribe and Navajo Nations. This was a complex incident involving two tribes, three counties and a very large geographical area.
- President Obama declared an emergency on January 24, 2010 and authorized Federal relief for the affected area.
- The President's major disaster declaration made Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs available for Apache, Coconino, Gila, Greenlee, La Paz, Mohave, Navajo and Yavapai Counties and the Gila River Indian Community, Hopi Tribe, Navajo Nation, San Carlos Apache, Tohono O'odham Nation and White Mountain Apache Tribe.
- The Governor's requests for Snow Assistance as well as activation of FEMA's Individual Assistance Program were denied, as was the appeal.
- We are working with seventy-three (73) applicants in this declaration.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$2,225,000 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$2,437,403 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

August 6, 2010 Meeting

- PROPOSAL #1: Supplemental funding for the Schultz Fire Post-Fire Flooding Emergency (11001) to support outstanding state obligations.
- COUNCIL ACTION: The Council unanimously approved to allocate \$1,300,000 for this proposal.

January 11, 2011 Meeting

- PROPOSAL #1: Supplemental funding for the Northern AZ Winter Storm Emergency (25004) to support outstanding state obligations.
- COUNCIL ACTION: The Council unanimously approved to allocate \$425,000 for this proposal.
- PROPOSAL #2: Supplemental funding for the February 2005 Winter Storm Emergency (25005) to support outstanding state obligations.
- COUNCIL ACTION: The Council unanimously approved to allocate \$65,000 for this proposal.
- PROPOSAL #3: Approve the request support Coconino County's Drainage Master Plan study for the communities downstream of the Schultz Post-Dire Burn Area for the Schultz Fire Post-Fire Flooding Emergency (11001).
- COUNCIL ACTION: The Council unanimously approved to support this proposal that will allow for identification of short-term and long-term mitigation efforts and solutions. No additional funds need to be appropriated at this time.
- PROPOSAL #4: Request for supplemental funding for the January 2010 Winter Storm Emergency (20102) to fund a mission assignment to the Salvation Army to address unmet housing needs.
- COUNCIL ACTION: The Council unanimously voted to table this motion until additional research into the State's legal authority could be conducted. If further discussion is to occur in a future meeting, an Executive Session will need to be called.

June 23, 2011 Meeting

- PROPOSAL #1: Supplemental funding for the January 2010 Winter Storm Emergency (20102) to support outstanding state obligations.
- COUNCIL ACTION: The Council unanimously approved to allocate \$10,000 for this proposal.

V. CONTINGENCIES

A. STATEWIDE SEARCH AND RESCUE CONTINGENCY (70100)

There were 588 search and rescue mission identifiers issued to County Sheriffs for field operations during FY2011. Costs reimbursed to County Sheriffs and State support agencies as well as audit costs incurred for this contingency totaled \$43,476.29. There were no funding allocations made for the Search and Rescue Contingency within fiscal year 2011.

B. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS CONTINGENCY (80100)

There were no hazardous materials incident responses supported by the Governor's HAZMAT Contingency Fund during the period July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011. Costs incurred for this contingency were audit costs for previous fiscal years in the amount of \$888.85. There were no funding allocations made for the Hazardous Materials Contingency within fiscal year 2011.
